Attendance Ladder







GRIP LEADERSHIP

On Friday the 24th February, our school captains, Declan, Buddy Leyton and myself, attended the GRIP Leadership conference at the



Highfields Cultural Centre. At this event, we gained valuable and necessary leadership skills that will assist us in our captaincy throughout the year, both in the school and throughout the community. It also allowed us to mingle with different schools and connect with other leaders from around the Toowoomba region.

This conference held four sessions where we learnt the necessary skills in order to be great leaders. Throughout these sessions there were 'loud noises' segments where students from all different schools had to play different games which built morale and made the day even more enjoyable.

Our first loud noises segment was 'making your school a great place for everyone'. This session taught us a valuable lesson in making everyone feel included and made us realise how important community was. We learnt that when a student feels welcome there is an environment filled with positivity and a sense of vibrancy.

The second session was 'the people a leader can make the most impact on'. Here we learnt about the importance of understanding our audience, who wants to be impacted and why they were to be impacted. This session allowed us to gain momentum by focusing first on three key categories where we will have an immediate impact. These are: people who already look up to you,

people left out by others, and people who are like minded.

The next sessions were elective sessions where Leyton and I learnt about how to get everybody participating in big events and Declan and Buddy learnt about the value of making every student feel included. Every student leadership team wants to see a greater participation in the events that they organise. Leyton and I learnt that there are many solutions to attaining participation and valued this session. Buddy and Declan learnt that a student leader shouldn't only be 'doing things' if none of it actually leads to students feeling comfortable and valued.

The last session was another elective session where we all learnt how to get everybody on board with a new idea and how to make it as effective as possible. We learnt the importance of always having a "why?" or a proper reason. This workshop gave us the strategies for getting school staff on board, as well as our fellow leaders and broader student body.

The day concluded with a quick Q & A and a final 'loud noises' segment. Overall, we had a great day and look forward to implementing our newly acquired skills throughout the year as school captains. We would also like to thank Miss Dixon for accompanying us on the day and the organisers of the event, as it would not have been possible without their help.

THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S INTERNATIONAL AWARD

Over the next few weeks, many students will be talking about, and signing up for, 'The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award' in both Bridge and Bronze sections. Our year 7's and 8's will receive information about signing up for Bridge at a year



level parade in the near future, and our 10's received information on Wednesday to take up the offer of a Bronze level or a continuation. Therefore, I thought it would be a good time to explain a little about the program.

The Duke Edinburgh's International Award is an internationally recognized program for young people, building their skills to equip them for life and work. The activities a participant chooses to undertake for each of the four sections is entirely up to them. It is a very personal program, offering young people a structure to fulfill their passions and ambitions in a way that suits them. Many students are already doing such activities. Participants have the freedom to progress through The Duke of Ed according to their personal needs and abilities and the individual sets the benchmark – there is no such thing as fail.

Many areas of the award can be completed at school with such programs as 'The Brekky Club', 'The Walking Club', any of a number of sports, and the Accelerated Reader program to name a few.

Nanango State High believes the program is extremely beneficial to the development of the student, so much so that all year 10 students are given the opportunity to sign up as a Bronze Participant or an Award Continuation at no cost to the student. This also includes payment for the Adventurous Journey component, which will be undertaken at Barambah Environmental Education Centre.

Once Bronze, Silver or Gold are completed, students receive additional QCE points, an award and badge at Awards Night and a great certificate for their resume.

Guidance Matters

In this edition of SchoolTV - RESILIENCE

Resilience is one of those skills that all kids need and should have. It refers to their ability to cope and adapt in situations when confronted with challenges such as adversity, trauma, tragedy, or even stress. It is essential to their mental health and wellbeing as part of their journey to adulthood. It is a skill that can be learned from an early age through the support of an adult role model.



However, being resilient does not mean your child won't experience any difficulties, but it will better equip them to manage those situations. Over-protective parenting can be viewed as being unhelpful towards the building of resilience. Although this may be a natural instinct, potentially experiencing failure is all part of the process. Encouraging children to take healthy risks will help them trust their capacity to deal with uncomfortable situations and increase their capacity for courage.

In this edition of SchoolTV, parents will gain an understanding of how to support their child's brave behaviour to help them adapt and build resilience.


