PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

This week's Principal's message is my speech from Awards Night. It is a great summary of many of the positive things that have occurred at Nanango State High School this year, and it outlines our plans for 2025.

I would like to congratulate all students who received awards on the night. It was a great school community event with Aleisha Gray, our guest speaker, delivering a very strong message. It doesn't matter what you do, you still need to work hard, there are no short cuts.

I would also like to acknowledge Tony Caccamo, CEO Envirospheres, for his continuing support of the school.

Good evening everyone.

I would also like to welcome our special guests here tonight.

Aleisha Gray (nee Marriot), our guest speaker and past Vice Captain of the school and owner of a very successful local business, South Burnett Hire and Sale.

Deb Frecklington (State Member for Nanango), Cr Jane Erkens, Cr Linda Little and Mayor Kathy Duff.

Thank you to Deb and Jane for your ongoing support of our school community and a special welcome to Kathy and Linda, who I believe are attending their very first Awards Night for our school.

I would also like to make a special welcome to Tony Caccamo, CEO of Envirospheres. We are fortunate that he has been able to be with us tonight and I would also like to acknowledge that Tony, over the last 12 months, has donated \$8,000 to our school. Thank you Tony and Envirosperes for this level of generosity.

This time last year when I stood up here, I had been here for 8 days, it is now 208 days and I can say a lot has happened!!

2023 finished with our graduating students achieving strong ATAR scores, and with the support of our Senior Outcomes Team, 100% of them achieved their Queensland Certificate of Education or Queensland Certificate of Individual Achievement.

Education Queensland completes a Next Steps survey, and of the 77.3% of our students who responded, 61% are engaged in education and training, with 30% of these engaged in a degree course.



While students have entered a wide variety of courses, the two most popular are courses linked with Health and Engineering related programs.

18% of our students have engaged with an apprenticeship or traineeship with an overall of 23.5% transitioning to employment.

These figures often represent above state average results and certainly above average for Wide Bay.

Our current group of Year 12 students, with the support of the Senior Outcomes Team, are on track to replicate the 100% achievement again this year.

In Years 7 to 10 and from our most recent reporting period, we have 91 .75% of students achieving an A to C result with 55% achieving A to B in Maths.

In English we have 78% achieving A to C and 39% A to B.

These are excellent outcomes for our students and reinforces to us that we are on the right track.

In 2023, we finished the year with an attendance rate of 77.8%.

Why is attendance at school so important? One main reason, it is so students remain connected. Connected to the school, their peers and their teachers.

I am sure those here tonight would agree that an attendance rate with a 7 in front of it, is not where we want to be, so we have worked very hard this year to improve this.

We have had zooper dooper, cupcake, sausage roll Friday, \$5 tuckshop voucher drawers for students with 100% attendance during the week and have given away a bluetooth speaker and laptop with another round to be given out later this term.

As a result of all of our staff really investing in this and particularly to our attendance team of Mr Askin, Ms Pollard and Mrs Schultz our attendance has moved into the 80's.

If we look at increased learning days, our students have gained more than 3500 days extra at school this year than in 2023. An excellent result, however, our job is not done and we will continue our focus on attendance moving into 2025.

Our staff have continued the enormous job of implementing new curriculum across the school. There have been new programs for our Year 11 applied subjects this year, with new syllabuses for Year 11 general subjects to be implemented in 2025.

We continue our preparations and implementation of V9 of the Australian Curriculum in years 7 to 10. It may be showing my age but I was around for Version 1, and while we are up to V9, there were 4 versions of V8, 8.1 to 8.4. As a school leader I am hoping this will be the last version for several years, to allow our staff and students to have that smooth continuity from year to year from the one curriculum.

At Nanango we are committed to absolute best practice in the classroom. This year, under Mr Braedon McKee, our acting HOD of Teaching and Learning, we now have 12 staff trained in a process called Profiling. This involves teaching staff and receiving direct feedback about their classroom practice from trained profilers. With our commitment to continual improvement this process will continue into next year.

Recently we received the feedback from our School Opinion Survey where 114 parents and carers, 126 students and almost 80 staff had the opportunity to provide feedback on a variety of school related matters.

It was overwhelmingly positive and I wanted to bring to your attention, not necessarily the best results, but the biggest improvements from 2023 to this year.

- 1. 87.3% of our parents and carers believe teachers at Nanango motivate their child to learn, up 11.5% from last year.
- 2. 81.6 % of students believe that Nanango looks for ways to improve, up 18% from last year.
- 3. 84.8 % of staff believe student behaviour is well managed at NSHS, up 27.5% from last year.

This feedback certainly indicates a great year but rest assured we will not rest on our laurels.

2024 has been an exceptionally tough year, not just for our community but the wider Queensland and Australian community. High interest rates, an increase in part time work participation and a tightening job market has placed more pressure on the household budget than I can recall in a generation.

As a school we recognise that our community is not immune from this.

To assist our families in 2025, the school has taken the decision to waive all resource scheme fees. This is a saving of \$250 for each student who attends the school. We will also continue to run curriculum related excursions at no cost to families.

At the beginning of 2025 all students will receive a Nanango State High School pack of supplies. This pack will include a Nanango High pencil case with pens and pencils, 5 x A4 notebooks, a ruler, eraser, sharpener and protractor. Students in Years 7 to 10 will receive a scientific calculator and students requiring a Graphics calculator in Years 11 and 12 will be able to loan one from our resource scheme at no cost.

Also, all students who present with a BYOx laptop will receive a Nanango High laptop hard case to protect the laptop screen, the most common damage that occurs in schools!

The school will be able to sustain this level of support for the duration of 2025, and we certainly hope there will be far less financial pressure on households and families this time next year, in comparison to today.

At this point in history, we live in very uncertain times. Every time we turn our newsfeed on we are exposed to information regarding the war in the Middle East, the election in the United States and issues in our own Asia Pacific region.

The most important thing we can offer our students and community as a school, is consistency. We are the same every day, our expectations remain the same, the way we communicate remains the same and our routines remain the same. For many of our students, this school is their community, and as a result it is our absolute priority to make this school community the most positive, welcoming and engaging place it can be. This year we have done this through our Positive Behaviour for Learning team or PBL, led by Mr Shaun Dati. As simple as celebrating a young person's birthday and giving them that small acknowledgment can go along way.

If you are friends with us on Facebook, you will have noted the constant flow of positive information about our students and school, managed extremely well by Mrs Deb Bygrave, not to mention the text messages sent home weekly, reminding our school community of important events occurring in the school.

All of this adds to the depth of positivity and strong positive culture that is so important for a school community in 2024 and also beyond.

In relation to consistency, the PBL team has led a review of our school values which are currently Safety, Respect, Effort and Responsibility.

After many hours of consultations with staff and the entire student body our new values are:

Safety, Respect, Effort and Responsibility. That's right, the values have not changed, however, how we think about them has.

This work will continue for the remainder of this year ready for implementation next year.

Looking ahead to 2025, we will continue on our curriculum development across all year levels, engage with Real Schools, a 3 year partnership on further developing our strong positive school culture based on restorative practises, focus on getting our attendance as close to 89% as we can, and implementing a new Flexi Learning Space called EmpowerED for up to 14 Year 9 students.

After today, Year 12 students have 2 days left before they start their external exams, an exciting time, and I look forward to seeing the results of thirteen years of education in mid-December and celebrating with these students and their families in week 7.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the staff of Nanango High, in particular those based in the Admin building, although I am concerned with their connection to one of our cows!

Also our very hard working Leadership team: Deb, Yvonne, Peter, Surene, Fi, Ben, Kieran, Mandy, Will, Linda, Michelle, Jade and Cheyne. Your unwavering commitment to your staff and the school is second to none and then the teaching and support staff who continue to offer our students the best opportunities possible, an absolute reflection on what I consider to be the best school in Queensland.

MATHS EXCURSION TO DREAMWORLD



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
VISUAL ARTS EXCURSION TO DREAMWORLD




